


Profile of the Status of Women and Girls in South Los Angeles

- Many structural, social, and cultural factors contribute to gender inequalities.
- Gender inequalities can differentially affect subsets of women (i.e., African American, Latina, female householders, undocumented immigrants, etc.).
- The consequences of gender inequality can be long-lasting and can include cycles of poverty and exploitation.
 - 35% of women in South Los Angeles live in poverty.
 - 13% of women in South Los Angeles live in deep poverty.
 - Los Angeles is a top point of entry for victims of human trafficking.
- Young girls can face additional challenges of navigating the foster care system.





 - United States* 9%


- Women living below 100% of the poverty level


Homelessness South Los Angeles, 2013

Some 7,045 homeless people were counted during a January 2013 Point-in-Time survey



Educational Attainment of Women (Aged 25+) South Los Angeles, 2009–2013




Educational Attainment of Men (Aged 25+) South Los Angeles, 2009–2013



Undocumented Immigrant Statistics 2009–2011

▪ Californians who are undocumented immigrants	2.6 million
▪ Undocumented immigrants in Los Angeles County (more than any other county in California)	>800,000
▪ Country of origin within Latin America	86%
▪ Attained some postsecondary schooling	10%
▪ Speaks English well	40%
▪ Undocumented immigrants in the workforce	11%
▪ Median annual earnings	\$18,000
▪ Living below 150% of the federal poverty level	56%
▪ Undocumented immigrant women who are employed	84%

Human Trafficking Global and National Statistics

- Global annual revenue from human trafficking \$150 billion
 - Proportion from sex exploitation 2/3
 - Proportion from labor exploitation 1/3

- Labor exploitation victims who are women and girls 55%
- Sex exploitation victims who are women and girls 98%

- Cases reported from California to the National Human Trafficking Resource Center in 2014 912
 - Cases related to sex exploitation 685
 - Cases for female victims 783


- FBI estimate of children sold to sex trafficking annually (trafficking remains largely underreported) 100,000

Human Trafficking Los Angeles Statistics

- Los Angeles is a top point of entry to the United States for victims.
- Los Angeles ranks 1st in the FBI's list of cities with the highest incidence of sexual exploitation of children.
- The Coalition to Abolish Slavery and Trafficking (CAST) was established in Los Angeles in 1998.
- 75% of the CAST clients served in 2014 were women and girls.
- In 2015, there were 998 calls to the CAST hotline reporting trafficking.

Racial Profile of Foster Youths in Los Angeles County, 2015



- 18,533 children were in foster care.
 - 9,217 of those children were girls.
- 9,943 children entered foster care in 2014.
 - 8,066 of those children entered foster care for the first time in 2014.
